Goultly's Photograph Gallery ("1370") and Rand's "chicken house" ("1360") in the 1880's

At one time Goultly's Photograph Gallery, one of two locations Goultly was in over the years, was at this location in the 1880's. Its windows, with rounded tops and interestingly divided panes, echoed the style of several buildings in Nauvoo built during the latter 1800's. The building was razed at some time. Circa the latter 1960's, John Brest built and ran "Nauvoo Electric" from this location.

This location was Rand's chicken house c. 1880's (1360 in photo at top of page). A photo, circa the 1888 shows a new building, Nelson's Agriculture Implements, in its place. (Goultly's 1370 remains to the left, or east.)

2. Addresses in quotation marks indicate no existing structure at this location in 2010.

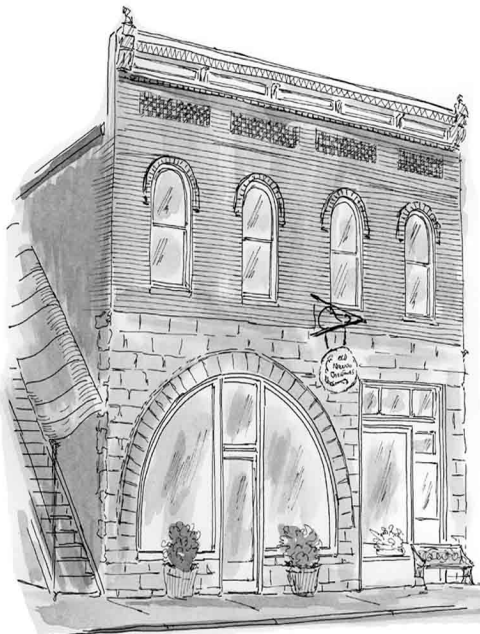
## 1360 Mulholland

c. 1888. The Nelson Implement Building's architecture does not reflect other architecture seen of the period along Mulholland. Its "pumpkin-eyed" windows lend a curious, almost comical façade on the east side, while the west side seems more austere.

"Nelson's Implement," built in 1888 by Joseph Nelson, Sr., was to be an agriculture implement business. In 1903, the east side (L.) became "People's State Bank," with Nelson, Sr., as its cashier. Its doors closed during the Depression in 1932.

People's State Bank (1903-1932) and, later, the post office (c. 1950-1960) were located in the building.

## Nauvoo Electric Light and Power Company

In the 1940's, the east side (L.) of the building became "Nauvoo Electric Light and Power Company," run by Joseph Nelson, Jr. (The power plant was located next door at the rear of what is now Nauvoo Pharmacy and was incorporated into the pharmacy as the "back room" when it was built in 1958.)

Circa the 1950's and 1960's, Nauvoo's post office was located in the store as well. It was accessed through the doorway on the "austere" west side of the building.

## Doctors Practice

A walkway on the east (L.) side leads to a door near the rear of the building that, for years, accessed office space for various doctors who practiced in Nauvoo: Haggett (c. 1918) (at this location?), Shaw, Dierker (1938-1957), Symmonds (c.1956), and Gundrum c.1960's.

## Grapevine Newspaper Office

For several years, c. 1960's, Clark Bergmeier and Max Bollin had an electric shop in the east side, front. By the time the 1970's rolled around, the building had become *The Grapevine* newspaper office with editor-publishers Jim and Hanelore Moffitt.

Little is known about the usage of the west; however, as the 1912 Sanborn Map notes, it was a paint and wallpaper business. (Ed Diemer's? John B. Eid's?) Subsequent businesses utilized both sides of the building as one.
